Apr 6. Project Self-Sufficiency. Since its creation in 1986 (with the involvement of our late member Sonya Hulbert), Project Self-Sufficiency of Sussex County has grown into a multi-faceted nonprofit agency meeting a wide range of community needs, including employment, health, parenting, food, domestic abuse counseling—and even Christmas gifts and prom dresses! Apr 27. The 10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's. The Alzheimer's Association® has a series of caregiver skill-building courses. Each course includes questions to check existing knowledge and exercises to apply new learnings to personal caregiving situations. Today, we'll learn how caregivers can recognize common early signs of Alzheimer's in themselves and others, and identify steps to take, including how to talk to their doctor. 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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT:



ICE: Seeing through the Lies

The Trump administration is barreling ahead with its plan to deport thousands, or even millions, of undocumented migrants. And the politicians behind it tell the same story—the current targets are the murderers and other extreme criminals among those migrants.

Funny thing, though. If you were looking for murderers, where would you expect to find them? They would typically be in prison or at least under indictment. Yet, the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents are ignoring the prisons and,

instead, are pulling people off the streets and out of homes.

So, apparently, ICE has identified thousands of very serious criminals among us, unknown to the police or local prosecutors. ICE has not shared this crucial information with the police, otherwise all these killers would have been apprehended a long time ago!

If this is what's happening, the ICE officials themselves should be arrested for withholding critically important criminal information. And ICE should be required to show the proof it has about all these alleged, unpunished crimes.

The alternative is that ICE is wildly exaggerating, or even inventing, the criminal allegations. Where are the names of the deportees? What are the dates and details of their supposed crimes? What are the reasons that ICE has kept this information to itself rather than sharing it with police? Why are none of these supposed criminals in jail when ICE picks them up?

It's time to end this charade. Our leaders in Washington are playing an old card. You scare people into agreeing with you. You tell them they are surrounded by terribly threatening, violent criminals, and you expect most people to be relieved when you attack the supposed problem. Then, you simply claim that everyone you arrest is one of the criminals.

It was the same story in Springfield, Ohio, late last year. Our current president, in a debate with rival Kamala Harris, declared that Haitian immigrants were eating other people's pet cats and dogs. There was no proof at all of that claim, not a smidgeon of evidence. But it had shock value. Lots of people believed it.

Certainly, in every population, there will be a smattering of criminals. But only in fantasy land would thousands of murderers exist among migrants (or any other group), unknown to the police or the rest of the justice system.

We are hearing lies, told by people who know better, to justify the racial and ethnic hatred that is actually at the core of the deportation plan.
