**Feb 2. You CAN Teach an Old Dog New Tricks.** This is the story of change. We're never too old to grow into something new, even at a mature age and even though it can be scary. Visiting minister Laura Kushner taught pre-school for years and found herself moved to metamorphose into something new. So, she enrolled in seminary and graduated from the Drew University Theological School in 2023. She currently works as a chaplain at Greystone Park Psychiatric Hospital. Led by Rev. Laura Kushner.

**Feb 9. The** *Bhagavad Gita*: **The Content and The Back Story.** The *Bhagavad Gita* is Hinduism's most famous scripture, but the story behind it is less well-known. The *Gita* is a small section inside the world's largest epic poem, the *Mahabharata*. That work, more than ten times the length of *The Iliad* and *The Odyssey* combined, is focused on a huge and deadly ancient war–a battle planned and promoted by the gods. Led by Stu Feldstein.

**Feb 16. Listening As an Act of Love.** What does it feel like when someone makes the time to listen to us so that we feel heard? How often do we make the time in our lives to do the same, to truly listen to a loved one? A friend? A stranger? How does listening look (or sound), and how can it be considered an act of love? Pauline E. Nijander, today's guest minister, completed her Master of Divinity program at the Drew University Theological School. Led by Rev. Pauline E. Nijander.

**Feb 23. Shout!** *Shout!* is a collection of original poetry and dramatic dialogs Susanna Rich wrote from the points of view of core suffragist figures ranging from the 1848 Seneca Falls Woman's Rights Convention to 2020 women "getting the vote," in another sense. Specializing in writing historical poetry, Susanna transforms carefully researched material into four-dimensional, you-are-here experiences for readers and audiences. Led by Susanna Rich.

#### Valentine's Day: Invented, Thank Goodness

But a bit of casual research tells us that the real Saint Valentine had nothing to do with romance. He was a Catholic clergyman, for starters. He also bugged the Romans, so he was martyred during the third century–beaten with clubs and beheaded.

In fact, the poor guy's skull is still on display behind glass in a church in Rome. Not really a sexy story, eh?

Then along came Geoffrey Chaucer, the English poet, author, and civil servant best known for *The Canterbury Tales*. In his poem *The Parlement of Foules*, written in the late 14th century, Chaucer connected Valentine with romance–for no clear reason beyond poetic license.

And that's all the encouragement people needed. Today, the holiday is celebrated all over the world. Americans give each other cards, flowers, and candy. In South Africa, women pin the names of love interests on their shirt sleeves. In the Philippines, there are mass weddings. I think Chaucer just gave us an excuse to express ourselves (one way or another) about the complex emotion that we value so much–our love of another person.

This month, we move from the more passive, yet powerful, powers of earth and air to the more active power of fire. This shift feels especially fitting during February, when we celebrate love and passion for life on Valentine's Day. Fire, with its warmth and intensity, energizes us to take action and engage with the world around us.

Inspired by the element of air, we finish *The Power of Silence* and begin *The Power of Listening* lesson. Here, the children will discover how truly listening–paying attention not only to words, but also to feelings and intentions–can strengthen relationships and build understanding.

Fire will be the central metaphor in *The Power to Shine* lesson, representing the power of direct action to make a positive difference. Continuing this power next month, the children will reflect on how they can use their light to inspire and support others.

These lessons connect deeply to our Unitarian Universalist values of compassion, respect, and the belief in the worth and dignity of every person. Thank you for supporting our children's spiritual growth as they explore these meaningful themes.

Below is a preview of our RE classes for February.

**Feb 2.** The children will learn to appreciate nature's sounds, reminding us that we share this world with many other beings and that we need to make sure there's a place for each one. Afterward, we'll participate in a silent meditation.

**Feb 9.** We'll share a story about listening to what people truly need before offering help. Afterward, the children will be challenged to pay extremely close attention to the rest of the group–the completion of a counting task relies on not interrupting each other.

**Feb 16.** Inspired by the Complaints Choir project, the children will take turns "ranting" about what's bothering them, while their partners practice listening empathetically. Then, we'll make I'm All Ears hats to wear as a reminder to listen more than we speak.

**Feb 23.** We'll add fire symbols and the action words Shine, Passion, Action, and Reaching Out to the Elements Mural.
