Sep 8. Freedom. The sounds, the symbols, the roots, and the many meanings of *freedom* have been everywhere recently. This has been due to the presidential campaigns, as well as to the fears and yearnings of Americans everywhere. We'll take a wide-ranging analytical look at the word, its meaning(s), and its relevance to us today. There will be several speakers, and we hope to elicit your ideas through give and take with the congregation. Led by Richard Goffman, Stu Feldstein, and others.

Sep 15. Annual Water Ceremony and Homily on Community. Please bring a small amount of water to represent summer significance, be it from the River Rhine or your tap. Words of meaning are an option. Rev. Doak will also offer a short reflection on community. Led by The Rev. Dr. Doak M. Mansfield.

Sep 22. President's Service: Living through the Death of Facts. The advent of the Internet has resulted in an explosion of information sources, and a similar explosion of alleged facts that often aren't checked and aren't true. The problem is peaking now, in an election year. Reality itself is becoming more uncertain. We'll look at how this has come to pass and what can be done about it. Led by Stu Feldstein.

Sep 29. Unsung Heroes. Linda Watkins-Goffman, a former flight attendant, remembers when her "glamorous" job took a dark turn and she found herself on flights into an active war zone. Operation Babylift was a desperate effort by unsung heroes in the days leading up to the fall of Saigon. Led by Linda Watkins-Goffman

The Gift That Helps Your Friends

Welcome back from a long summer break! It's great to begin another season of spiritual development and communion with friends.

This September will be like no other you've recently experienced at the UUFSC. You are returning to a more financially stable organization. Something happened.

One of our founding members, Clare Callender, passed away in July at age 100. In her will, Clare left us a bequest of \$20,000. Clare led a life of service to others, as a school nurse and Planned Parenthood leader, and in death she wanted to help the group she had aided in its infancy.

This is the first bequest we've received in years. We'll put it to good use. You'll notice, for instance, that the dangerously rotted staircase behind the building has been replaced by a new pressure-treated construction. We'll be painting it when the wood has dried. This is merely the first use of Clare's gift.

We put in a great deal of work and time on the rummage sale to earn a fraction of what Clare provided. And some other fundraisers—like the old soup-and-sandwich lunches—generated just \$5 a head. These things really put the size of Clare's bequest in context. We'll be erecting a plaque in her memory, in the building.

Personally, I'm going to follow Clare's example, and I've spoken to another member who is doing the same. I know that, when my own time comes, I'll be comforted knowing that my second family, the UU, will be a beneficiary.

Improvements!

The new stairway was built in August. It's the latest in a string of capital improvements—the busiest period for such work that I can recall.

The new landscaping in front of the building survived a summer with serious dry spells, thanks to some members doing watering.

Inside the building, we have new audio-visual equipment and the ability to post sermons as videos on YouTube. Many thanks to Phil Schaming, Hal Cohen, and Jim Kasprzak for their work on this.

That's not all. We have two new steel doors with inside push bars, improving our security and fire safety. And, we have a new Bosch dishwasher, replacing the old one that died.

THIS MONTH IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Welcome back friends!

Greetings! As we embark on a new Fellowship year, we're filled with excitement and gratitude to welcome you and your children back to our religious education program. I hope that the summer months have been a time of rest, renewal, and growth for your families.

This year we've chosen the unit titled *The Powers Within You*. This unit uses the metaphor of the four elements—earth, air, fire, and water—to explore different forms of power we each can express. Young people will be given opportunities to use their power as agents for positive change.

The program begins with a unit on earth and the powers associated with it—connection, roots, growth, and place. The second unit features the powers associated with air—stillness, presence, silence, and listening. The third unit centers on the powers of fire—shine, passion, action, and reaching out. The program concludes with three powers of water—flexibility, persistence, and gathering. The final session honors all of the elements' power to transform.

Our hope is that we can work together to foster a strong sense of community and faith that will inspire our children to live lives rooted in compassion, service, and love. We invite you to reach out with any questions, concerns, or suggestions throughout the year.

Below is our RE calendar for September.

Sep 8. and **Sep 15.** The **Power of Earth.** In these first sessions, the children will explore the concept that the power of earth is the power of grounding and connection. Activities will help participants get to know one another better, as finding their connections deepens their sense of earth power. Participants will create a graphic image of the four elements as four quarters of a circle to use for the duration of this program.

Sep 22 and Sep 29. The Power of Roots. In these sessions, the children will learn to develop a connection to our origins and to honor the diversity of our roots and heritages. Participants will learn that we're grounded in all that has shaped our lives, from our own memories back through the experiences of our ancestors, including the features of the place in which we live—its geography, ecology, and history.
